January 13, 1933 - February 1, 2022

George Sargent of the Town of Greenville, NY, passed away on Tuesday, February 1, 2022, from a short bout with Covid. He'd just turned 89 years old. He was the son of the late Andrew Sargent and Amelia MacWilliams and was born in Middletown, NY.

As a young child his family moved to Scranton, PA and then they moved back to Middletown, NY where George graduated from Middletown Highschool. He then met his first wife Geneva Odell and married her in 1951. One and a half years later he was inducted into the army- 1953. He was a PFC who worked in the motor pool as a truck driver in the Korean War. In 1991 Geneva passed away and the following year he met and married his second wife, Rita Lamando, who predeceased him in 2020.

George worked as a courier for the Middletown Board of Education. He also worked as a Polling Inspector in the Town of Greenville for the Board of Elections. George was also a volunteer firefighter for the city of Middletown, NY. He loved playing golf and was an avid hunter and fisherman. George and his second wife also traveled the east coast from Maine to Florida, then to Houston, Texas.

He is survived by his stepchildren; Frank Lamando Jr. (Jean) of Westtown, NY, Fleuraine Lamando Sniffen (Larry) of Greenville, NY, Fred Lamando (Connie) of Houston, TX, and Douglas Lamando (Judy) of Landisville, NJ. He was predeceased by his first wife Geneva, his brothers Art Sargent and Eugene Sargent, his sister Gladys Cuba, plus his second wife Rita Sargent.

When you entered our mom's life in 1992 you brought a great and adventurous life to our mom. You brought her from a post loss of a loved one, Dad, to a renewed person able to venture out and accomplish new goals none of us ever saw possible. For this, I am eternally grateful to you.

You welcomed Connie and me and our two young sons into your life with great affection. You demonstrated your selflessness and caring for me, after I had shoulder surgery, and you offered to drive me to physical therapy. You drove 30-minutes to our house in Glen Spey, NY to pick me up, another hour and a half to my physical therapy, and then 30 minutes back to your home - twice a week, for 3 months!

Your love of travel brought you, Mom, and Aunt Olga to drive to Houston to spend time with us, where Mom had the opportunity to reconnect with Aunt Jane, Dad's youngest sister, whom Mom had not seen in many years. I remember they both hugged and cried and talked a long time. This would not have happened without you, Pop, initiating the trip.

When we moved from Houston, TX, back to Binghamton NY, you helped us with several projects. One fun time I recall when you offered to bring up your tiller, in the back of one of your pickup trucks, of course, so I could till, and grass seed our new yard. You had lots of fun backing up over our curb and front yard, then wrapping a big chain around several stumps, and yanking them out of the ground, one by one, with your mighty truck. What a big grin you wore that day!

Since then, you and Mom visited us many times, and we in turn, visited you many times. For the many family parties at Aine's house,

we would go to your house first and visit before we walked over to the party.

Since we moved back to Houston, we have not been able to see you as often. Most recently, when I called you on your birthday, again when you got sick, and again when you were in the hospital, which turned out to be our last conversation, you always responded with your usual "Hey, Son", and I could hear your smile through the phone. From the beginning, you had always called me "Son", and that kept us close and warmed our hearts. A special bond. Always.
